Festival of Trees to kick off Christmas season

For 35 years, Weiser Memorial Hospital Foundation's Festival of Trees has effectively marked the beginning of the Christmas season.

This year's event, sponsored by Ridley's Family Market Place, will run Wednesday, Dec. 1 through Saturday, Dec. 4 at the Vendome Events Center, located at 309 State St. in downtown Weiser.

Styled as "O' Night Divine," the 2021 installment signals full sleighs ahead for many but also serves as the Foundation's signature annual fundraiser.

"All the money that we raise benefits Weiser Memorial Hospital," said Foundation Director Casey Ney.

In years past, money raised has gone toward things like remodeling the hospital's CT scan room, an update of the emergency department, and other projects.

"This year, we are focusing on specific programming and 'asks' to the Foundation," Ney explained. "Employees can make specific 'asks' for whatever equipment or things that help make their lives easier. I write to other foundations for funding, but if someone comes to me and needs a piece of equipment, the money

from this fundraiser allows us to directly award that."

The Festival of Trees features about 15 festively decorated trees this year, all of them to be auctioned off to the highest bidder

"This is no joke," Ney said. "Our trees sell for thousands of dollars."

In 2019, the Foundation raised \$89,000 between tree purchases and its ticketed events.

Wednesday is the Foundation's Gala night, which consists of a live auction, individuals putting in their bids for the trees, and food. The trees are created by a range of community members and businesses, including the Memorial Hospital, Peoples Furniture, and more.

"If you have ever been to a live auction, they play other games," Ney said. "For example, you can buy a card out of a deck, basically like a 50-50 split, so they have some other games the auctioneers like to play to raise money."

Ney said she has already pre-sold 150 tickets at \$60 each. Normally, the event hosts over 40 tables and approximately 350 people but is being scaled down a bit this year.

"We are going to host 34 tables, which averages out to about 272 guests," she said. "There are options for people to buy a four-top, six-top, eight-top, or 10-top, so people can sit more privately. We sell out every year."

On Thursday, Dec. 2, the Foundation will hold its Sip and Paint event sponsored by Bonnie Akbar, owner of Artful Bon's, which gives individuals the opportunity to paint a scene and bring the work home. Cost is \$40.

"It's a great opportunity. So, you go, and you don't know how to paint, but somehow you create this magnificent thing under Bonnie's direction," Ney said. "You get a little commemorative wine glass. Not everyone has wine, you can have some Martinelli's if you'd like, but some people like to sip on wine as they paint."

There are only 40 tickets for this event, so order tickets early.

The Open House portion of the Festival begins on Friday, Dec. 3, running from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Saturday, Dec. 4 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

On Friday, students will take time off from school to experience the Festival in person.

"We partner with the schools, so the second graders come in; they get bussed over and they come and get to see the trees, and we give them cookies and hot cocoa," Ney said. "It's a time to enjoy the festival and to brush up on table manners, so it's like an adult thing for the kids to practice."

Ney added that music will be performed during the Open House.

"We will have local talent; singers, dancers and stuff like that," she said. "When the kids come in, there is a singer or two and they get to witness the whole festival experience."

In addition, there will be a decorated "Opportunity Tree," which people can enter to win. The tree will be delivered to the winner on Sunday. Trees won at the auction earlier in the week will be delivered on Sunday as well.

"We want to thank Ridley's for once again sponsoring our event," Ney said. "That's a really big deal because they donate a lot of money to us and support us in a big way during the festival."

Midvale tree lighting set for Nov. 28

It's old fashioned, and that's how the residents of Midvale like it – carolers, hot chocolate, and the warmth of each other's company.

The community is set to hold its annual tree lighting ceremony on Sunday, Nov. 28 at 6 p.m in Tin Pan Alley.

Organizer B.J. Whitener described the event as a small, intimate setting, although over 100 area residents showed up for last year's event to take part in the enthusiasm surrounding the kick-off to the Christmas season.

"It pretty great. Everybody comes out and we light the tree, and then we go into the [Midvale] Merc for cookies and hot chocolate," she said. "Everybody comes out the weeks prior to help decorate the town, get the tree set up and decorated. It's really old fashioned, but it's so great and we love it."

Preparations for the ceremony began almost two weeks ago, dozens of community members coming together to make the town a festive place for the holidays, and although decorating a town for Christmas can be expensive, there is never any lack of funds

"It costs a lot to do what we do, but we never have to go out and ask for money," Whitener said. "People just donate, not just money but time."

Decorating the town and the tree was once the passion of June Craig and Marilyn Williams, who made it their mission to do it right. Both have since passed away, and there was a short lull in decorating activity that followed, but people like Whitener and many others stepped up to keep the tradition alive.

"They started it years ago

and the whole town would help; it was their legacy," Whitener said. "A lot of us have taken over. There are so many people involved, like Kenny Cantrell. He has so much enthusiasm and I love that. He's the one who always wants to go bigger and better. He has had the tree picked out for months."

As is the custom in Midvale, this year's tree comes from Tom and Fawn Seid's ranch.

"It's fun because all the kids come to get the tree," Whitener said. "They are excited and are climbing all of the other trees."

This year's tree is 35-feet tall

and was put into a six-foot hole, and then anchored to keep it in place. Those with heavy equipment, which is most everybody in Midvale, come to help decorate, including Midvale Mayor Brian Graham, who has a bucket truck.

"If we really need something more, my husband, Jesse, works for Midvale Telephone, and we can bring a bigger bucket truck out," Whitener said. "It's such a great time of year and so many people help make it happen. Then, we light the tree, sing some carols and go have cookies and hot chocolate."

Cambridge water tower to be lighted Dec. 4

The water tower in Cambridge has been serving residents long before most were born, but on Saturday, Dec. 4 it will serve an additional purpose.

Since October, volunteers have been busy rigging it with hundreds of strings of lights that will cascade down from the top to its base, forming the shape of a Christmas tree, which is topped with a massive lighted star.

Spectators are invited to come witness the Dec. 4 lighting ceremony to be held at Water Tower Park at 7 p.m. The event effectively marks the beginning of the 2021 Christmas season in Cambridge.

Santa Claus and his elves will be on hand to help kick it off, along with the Upper Country Singers and local FFA kids handing out cookies and hot chocolate. There will also be a toy drive and a local pastor will also provide some comments on the true meaning behind the season.

There are few cities that light their water towers to start the Christmas season.

In fact, Cambridge is the only known community in the area to utilize its water tower in lieu of a traditional Christmas tree. But when all is done, those who witness the event, and see the tower as they motor by on Highway 95, will understand why.

Standing at 110-feet tall, it is about three times taller than some of the largest Christmas trees installed in cities all over the country and once lighted, it can be seen for miles.

"It's strung out on cable, so there are something like 12 strands per tree – there will be trees on two sides of the tower – and they are gathered at the top and spread out as they go all the way down, creating the illusion of a tree," said local business owner and Cambridge Commercial Club member Megan Warren. "It's a beautiful thing to see and people love it."

The grandeur and Christmas ambiance it creates comes at a price and takes time to organize and execute.

The cost, however, is covered by funds generated by the annual Hells Canyon Jam held every summer and generous individual donations.

"It's pretty expensive; We've done a good job getting quality, commercial grade outdoor lights, and the rigging is really important," Warren said. "We had to change the rigging from last year. Our goal is to have a tree on all four sides of the water tower. This year we were able to raise enough money through community donations and Hells Canyon Jam to get more lights for the project. All the money

from the Jam goes to scholarships and things like this."

It has taken dozens of volunteers, some of them local Idaho Power employees, over 100 hours over seven weeks to accomplish.

"The community just gives from the heart, I mean, we didn't have to ask for money. People just give money. They always ask how they can help, how they can volunteer. It has really been genuinely magical and it's going to be a magical night to set off Christmas. I hope people will take a little trip to come see it because it is worth seeing."






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Local businesses ramp up for Small Business Saturday

Big retailers have enjoyed the fruits of Black Friday for dec-

It might be interesting to note that the phrase was originally coined in Philadelphia in the 1960s, marking the beginning of the Christmas buying season, the day after Thanksgiving, when most businesses start making the "big" money, transitioning from the "red," in accounting vernacular, to the "black."

It has become a tradition that has served the retail industry

Over the years, however, many have asked why the smaller guys shouldn't have something to boost their businesses, too.

Enter Small Business Saturday (SBS), a time carved out between Black Friday and Cyber Monday where the public is invited to do some of its Christmas shopping someplace other than Walmart, Costco, or Target.

American Express founded SBS in 2010 to encourage consumers to support local businesses and communities. The U.S. Senate passed a resolution recognizing and supporting the day in 2011, consumers spending a reported \$140 billion nationwide over the course of SBS's relatively short history.

In Weiser, the event technically kicked off Monday, Nov. 22, the Weiser Chamber of Commerce initiating a "Blackout Bingo" game played throughout the entire Thanksgiving week.
