



Polls to be open for in person voting for the general election

Clerk's office asks that those who requested an absentee ballot but would like to go to the polls to contact them

The Nov. 3 election is fast approaching and the Washington County Clerk's office is working on getting absentee ballots put together and sent out.

During the May primary election there was no live voting at the polls. Due to social distancing and concern of the risk to poll workers and the public from coronavirus, Governor Brad Little and Secretary of State Lawrence Denney made the decision to conduct the May 19 primary election by absentee voting.

The Idaho State Legislature held a special session in August to discuss the November election. Senate

School board votes to move to a modified level 1 school schedule

The Weiser School District board of trustees voted on Monday to change the level of delivery of educational services provided to the students in the district. The proposed plan will go into effect in two weeks.

Currently the school district is in a level 2 delivery of service with students attending in-person two days a week and receiving online instruction on Wednesdays.

The board agreed to change the level of delivery to a modified level 1, with all students attending school Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday and continue with the online instruction on Wednesday.

The online learning on Wednesday will allow for sanitation of the school buildings and allow the teachers to have time to prepare their lesson plans.

Newly appointed Weiser School District trustee Heather Thomas was sworn into office Monday of this week, replacing long-time zone five trustee Kerry Nyce after announcing his retirement.

Thomas has lived in Weiser for 20 years with her two children who graduated from the Weiser school system in 2010 and 2020. She has a long resume of service to her community, including working as a volunteer EMT on the Weiser ambulance

and a former member of the sheriff's posse.

After being contacted by a friend and attending several school board meetings, she gained an interest in the open trustee position and made the decision to submit a letter of interest and resume.

"I kind of knew after the first meeting that it was my jam, so to speak," she said.

After an application process, an open meeting interview was scheduled, and Thomas later learned that she "got the nod," she said.

Thomas said she has had experience with board service, serving for a time as a board member of Surviving Hearts cancer support group. She said she was fortunate to have a very supportive family and friends and has learned as an adult that many have not been as fortunate.

"If you can make the difference in one person's life, I think you should," she said. Education is of particular interest for

Public is invited to comment on three ordinances proposed by Washington County commissioners

Public hearing to be held on Monday, Sept. 21 at the Vendome Events Center

Three ordinances covering the usage of public lands in Washington County are being considered by the county commissioners and, if voted in, will be added to Washington County code.

The language in the ordinances also defines the enforcement and penalties if an individual or federal agency violates any rules in such ordinance. The sheriff of Washington County will have the authority to enforce the law and sets a penalty for each violation. The charges will be a misdemeanor and each is punishable with a \$1,000 fine or 1 year in jail or both.

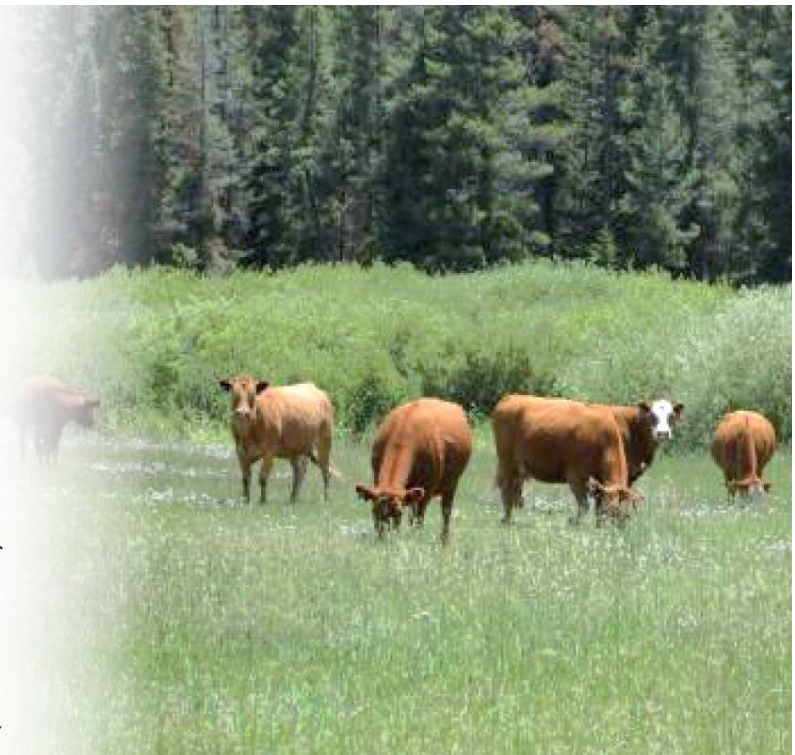
Ordinance 86 regulates

prescribed burns on public lands. Ordinance 87 is in regards to road closures on federal lands and requires federal land administrators to obtain written permission to close a road. Ordinance 88 will ensure property rights on split estate lands.

A public hearing has been scheduled on Monday, Sept. 21 at the Vendome Events Center at 2 p.m.

The purpose of ordinance 86 is to promote the health, safety and general welfare of the people of the state of Idaho. Under the Land Use Planning Act of the State of Idaho, the intent of ordinance 86 is to protect life and property

Museum receives a large donation of wild animals

Display will feature birds and animals common to Washington County by Sarah Imada

Preserving local history for future generations to learn from and enjoy is the key role that museums play in a community. From small museums to large museums their displays tell the stories and histories of past generations.

The Snake River Heritage Center museum board of directors has been very fortunate over the years to receive donations from individuals to add to their collection. A recent donation of mounted birds and wild animals was given to them from the late Jacqueline Sumner's parents' collection.

Sumner's parents, Joe and Myrtle Stroner were avid hunters and Joe took up the hobby of taxidermy in the 1930s. In an article that appeared in the Jan. 25, 1945 *Weiser American*, Joe told the reporter that he assigned himself the task of shooting and stuffing a pair of every kind of bird in the state of Idaho. The collection at the time of the article included 25 pairs of birds and his total bird collection included around 110 species. He had a total of 28 animal heads mounted.

Myrtle passed away in 1970 while she and her husband were hunting in Idaho's wilderness area and Joe died in 1985.

The animals had been stored in Sumner's garage and when the museum acquired the collection much work was needed to get them cleaned up and ready to be displayed.

With patience and a gentle hand two volunteers worked many hours to get this large collection ready to be displayed. Lisa McKnight cleaned the mounted heads and pelts and Dottie Emert made sure all the feathers on the birds shined.

Mike Henigan helped identify each animal in the collection, matching markings specific to each animal in the display.

Two golden eagles were included in the collection. The museum is currently working with government agencies to get

permission to display the pair since eagles are a protected species. Emert is also working with Idaho Fish and Game to get permission to display a big horn sheep.

In about a month the collection will be ready for viewing in the hallway of the second floor. The birds will be in cases provided by the family, the heads will be mounted on the wall and the birds of prey will be in the center in a plexiglass case. A buffalo and a couple of steer horns can be seen in the Oregon Trail exhibit.

"The acquisition of the Jacqueline Sumner collection of mounted mammals and birds allows us to exhibit, discuss and teach museum visitors about the wildlife common to Washington County," Emert said.

Weiser's museum, the Snake River Heritage Center, is located in one of Weiser's most prestigious buildings on the Intermountain Institute campus.

The Intermountain Institute was established in the fall of 1899 by Reverend Edward A. Paddock. He wanted to give high school age students who lived too far in the country the opportunity to receive an education. The school's motto was "An education and trade for every boy and girl who is willing to work for them," and all students had to work to pay their part of the tuition and room and board.

Paddock believed schools should educate "the hand and heart as well as the head."

Hooker Hall, the home of the museum's exhibits, served as the Institute's administration and classroom building and features a five-story clock tower. There is also an auditorium where local musical productions are held.

The Snake River Heritage Center is currently open for tours from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday. Guided tours can be made by calling a staff member, Dottie Emert, 208-549-1673 or by texting Lisa McKnight at 208-230-5229.

Local music artist wins the Josie Music Award

Dave Nudo and Dusty Leigh honored for duet

Cambridge resident and local music talent Dave Nudo recently earned the honor of winning a Josie Music Award for the song “Like You Were Forbidden” a duet he wrote with fellow Idaho musician Dusty Leigh.

Nudo and Leigh were nominated amongst 30,000 other song submissions to the Josie Music Awards. The pair won amongst 20 other nominees in the category of Best Musical Collaboration of the year.

“Writing and performing a song that was nominated for an award is an amazing feeling and quite an accomplishment! Being acknowledged at all in that large of a group is pretty miraculous to me,” Nudo said.

Nudo said that being at the event and winning was a very surreal experience. He and Dusty Leigh kept each other from falling on the way down the aisle. Thankfully what to say and who to thank came naturally because Nudo said it was like an out of body experience and he was fully on autopilot.

Nudo describes his music he writes for his band as “northern country rock.” His songs are about living, loving, losing, winning and just focusing on words from the heart that we can all relate to. He would say it’s country music with a southern rock feel, but since he has lived his entire life in the northwest, he felt the label of #NorthernCountryRock was more fitting to describe his style and the feel of his music.

Over the years Nudo has been in a few bands and he’s written songs for all of them. Through all the heartaches of disbanding and watching all the hard work turn to dust, he came to a conclusion that it is not worth it to put all that time and effort into something that can be so easily destroyed because of an ego trip or a bad attitude.

He began writing and featuring songs that focused on him alone with his acoustic guitar. He added a few covers to his set, and he found he was making some money from his songs and performances.

A few friends started joining him on stage and together they produced the album of his original songs called “County Line,” and the “Dave Nudo Band” was born.

“Now the band can’t break up unless I split in half!” Nudo said.

Right now, Nudo has a great group of musicians playing with him on stage that he is hoping will stay with him until the end: Sam Rothwell, Jeff Webb, Mitch “Chrome Red” Williams and Greg Breidinger.

In addition to songs from “County Line,” the group plays a few songs Nudo wrote and recorded in Nashville, Tenn., with industry pros who have played on many country radio hits including several of Luke Combs songs and many others.

Getting opportunities like that peaked the interest of more people, and Nudo got to open for a touring band “Cashed Out” where he shared a bill with and met his (now) good friend Dusty Leigh. Since then, Dusty and Nudo have collaborated on a few songs including the award winning “Like You Were Forbidden.”

As a result of the collaboration, both Nudo and Leigh were signed (independent from each other) to an Indie label called Emanant Music Group.

The inspiration for “Like You Were Forbidden” came pretty naturally. Nudo woke up with a line and a melody stuck in his head so he grabbed a cup of coffee and put pen to paper. Half an hour later he had the meat and potatoes written.

Later that day, Nudo finished the song and sent a recording of it to show his friends Dusty Leigh and Wade Huston. His wife Tara suggested that he ask Leigh to sing it with him as a duet and then about a half hour later, Huston also suggested it should be a duet with Leigh.

Two of Nudo’s other more successful songs have been “At My Grandpa’s Table” because it resonates well with every audience. And “Lean Into Me” a song about having someone to hold onto through the good times and the bad times is currently getting really good traction on Indie radio stations.

Nudo plays local events as often as he can. He performs often at Indiancreek Steakhouse and his next performance with Dusty Leigh is set for Sept. 19 at Double Diamond Saloon. You can also follow the Dave Nudo Band on Facebook and Instagram and add his music on Spotify.

City crews continue road work on E. Commercial St.

Wow! Wasn't the smoke this last weekend intense? Looking across the street last Sunday morning the neighbor's house looked fuzzy. That is smokey! I guess that is one more reason to wear a mask. It is also the reason the State Department of Environment Quality has placed a ban on all burning for now.

As you are probably aware, the 2020 Census is still in process. As a State, Idaho leads the nation in responding to the census. The latest online data shows that 73.3 percent of Weiser residents have responded. If you have not, you still have time, but it is getting close to the Sept. 30 deadline.

Completing the census is a simple process that can be done in one of three ways,

1. Go online to 2020census.gov,

follow the instructions, and complete the questionnaire.

2. Call 844-330-2020, for English language, or 844-468-2020, for Spanish language, to answer the questions verbally.

3. If you received a questionnaire by mail and can still find it, just fill it out and mail it back in.

The census determines where literally hundreds of billions of dollars of your federal taxes are spent on roads, schools, police, fire, and in a myriad of other purposes. If an accurate count is not made, we stand to lose our fair share of the benefits we pay for with our taxes. So please, if you haven't already done so, take a few minutes now to help yourself and our community and answer the census questions.

In city news this week, the street crew is continuing to work on E. Commercial between E. 9th and E. 11th. This is quite a project.

Originally there was no base laid under the asphalt, so the road, consisting of just a few inches of asphalt on dirt, was soft and subject to breaking up. The street crew has now removed asphalt from the worst section, set the asphalt aside, and dug down and removed 16 inches of dirt from under the street. This will require around 200 truck loads of dirt to be removed.

They will use the asphalt removed, as well as gravel, to fill in the 16 inches to form a new solid base under the road. When completed, this section of street will be able to stand up for quite some time without major work to it.

The City would have liked to have done this with more of East Commercial, but that is all we have funds for in this fiscal year.

Well that's it for this week. Please pray for rain to stop the fires and clear the skies.

Idaho Legislature met in special session

The Idaho Legislature met in special extraordinary session the week of August 26, 2020 to consider a limited liability bill and to end the Governor's state of emergency relating to COVID-19 along with two election bills.

H6 provides individuals, businesses, associations, churches, local governments, schools and higher education from civil liability for damage or injury as a result of exposure to COVID-19 and any of its mutations.

This does not include intentional or reckless misconduct.

Many were concerned that without immunity the above entities were at such risk of lawsuits they could not effectively operate. Health officials have stated it is virtually impossible to prove where a person contracted a coronavirus which include many types of flu and colds.

H6 passed the House 54-15 and the Senate 27-7. It was signed by Governor Little and went into effect immediately thereafter.

HCR1, to end the emergency, followed the Idaho Constitution, Article II which is the separation of powers of the three branches of government, and Idaho Code 46-1008 authorizing the length of emergencies and providing Legislative authority to end emergencies.

IC 46-1008 allows the governor to issue an emergency for 30 days with one 30 day extension. It does not allow for continual renewal.

The Governor issued the first emergency proclamation March 13, 2020 and has constantly renewed emergency proclamations with

the latest on August 7, 2020.

IC 46-1008 authorizes the Legislature to end an emergency proclamation at any time with passage of a concurrent resolution. (The Legislature must be in session to pass any bill.) The law also directs that upon passage, the governor shall issue an executive order or proclamation ending the emergency.

Concurrent resolutions are not subject to a governor's veto as this is the proper legislative branch check on the power of the executive branch provided in Article II of the Idaho Constitution.

HCR1 passed the House 48-20. However, the Senate chose to not take up the concurrent resolution as they reasoned the governor should have asked the Legislature to take up that subject in his proclamation calling for a special session.

The House reasoned 46-1008 does not allow an emergency to continue beyond 60 days maximum yet Idaho had been in an emergency for 160 days meaning the Governor had clearly

exceeded his authority. Stopping the emergency is within the Legislature's authority and is the exact purpose for our system of checks and balances.

Our system was not designed for one branch to wait for the offending branch to give permission for that check. The Senate killed HCR1 and then passed a senate resolution, SR101, which has no legal teeth, of a wish list for January. They did not send SR101 to the House for action.

S1001 passed both chambers to allow the county clerks to open and prepare absentee ballots seven days before the election. Those ballots are not to be counted until after the polls are closed election night.

H1 passed both chambers to provide that each county will have at least one polling place available for those who wish to vote in person on the day of the election.

Weiser High School grad enjoying entrepreneurial success

Chance Stevenson developed a line of footwear that is growing in popularity

Chance Stevenson, a Weiser high school alum from the Class of 2002, is making his own footprint in the world through a growing footwear company, NuSol sandals, which are not only proudly American made, but manufactured locally in Ontario, Ore.

When Stevenson became president of High Country Plastics, he wanted to diversify the company and he found good possibilities in EVA.

There are not many EVA manufacturers in the U.S., and most of the machinery is produced overseas. So although Stevenson had to take a trip to Taiwan to visit several companies that produce the equipment and molds, he knew there would be many possibilities in the field.

Stevenson's company started manufacturing EVA products in October of 2015 and manufactured for several customers until 2017. When his primary customer decided to take their manufacturing overseas, that left Stevenson with a very significant financial investment in equipment.

Rather than sell off the machinery, he decided that he already understood sales, had distribution channels in place, and had refined the manufacturing process, so why not launch his own brand to compete with the import companies? This is when NuSol was born.

NuSol sandals are unique for several reasons. First, 100 percent of the products are made in the U.S. If you were to look in your shoe closet,

you would notice that very few other brands can claim that. Most shoes are produced in China, Vietnam, India, etc.

The recent increase in the public demand, and support for U.S. companies in 2020 has made this even more important to the NuSol company.

Currently, the shoes are made in the United States, but use plastic distributed from Taiwan. Stevenson is very excited because in the near future, the company will be changing distributors to a plastic source from Indiana, making the product manufactured with 100 percent American product.

NuSol is also unique in its design. The soles feature a great blend of arch support with a deep heel cup to provide all day comfort, and promote the correct posture.

The material is also unique to NuSol. Although other shoe companies use EVA manufacturing, the formula for the EvaSol material, makes it a distinct texture that is designed to conform to a person's foot, while providing a blend of softness and bounce back that reduces impact on joints.

Stevenson shared that while he does not quite feel like NuSol has "made it" just yet, he is enthusiastic with where NuSol is today. Despite the economic uncertainty brought about by COVID-19, NuSol is still on track to achieve the 2020 goals of doubling revenue over 2019, increasing NuSol dealers to approximately 700 stocking across U.S. & Canada, along with developing export business into Japan.

For 2021, NuSol's goal is to double revenue again, have over 1,200 stocking dealers, continue developing their export business, and introduce two new styles to the line.

"We've certainly come a long way since our first Cascade Flip Flops came off the production line in July of 2018, and I'm more confident than ever that NuSol has a bright future," Stevenson said.

One of the biggest reasons for NuSol's success has been the incredibly positive customer feedback. The reviews have been overwhelmingly positive, even to the extent that Stevenson sometimes worries the brand appears as though it's paying for the reviews.

Everyone's foot is as unique as their fingerprint, but NuSol has received feedback from customers who had been suffering with horrible plantar fasciitis pain even after having a steroid injection. And customer feedback like that makes it very rewarding to know the product truly made a difference in someone's life.

As president of the company Stevenson's role within the company focuses on the company vision including brand identity, directional concepts, oversight of new designs, financial structuring, and 3-5 year planning.

He works with an internal team that works on designs with an outside engineering group to produce drawings and 3D prototypes. While Stevenson has a voice in design, he shares that he relies heavily on key employees and outside engineers who are vastly talented and know-

edgeable in design.

Stevenson now resides in Meridian with his wife and fellow Weiser alum Sarah (Huston) Stevenson and daughter Cora. He shared that he and his wife enjoyed the opportunities, environment, and sense of community they learned from growing up in Weiser

and that has remained very valuable to them in adult life.

Stevenson said he was influenced greatly by the leadership of his teachers and coaches including Kevin Knight, Todd Cady, John Srholec Jr., Doug Dickerson and countless others over the years.

Competing for Weiser and representing our community while at those competitions, was key to learning leadership skills and the importance of integrity and standing behind a quality product and a quality company, just as he was taught to represent his school and community.

Absentee ballots to be sent out by Sept. 30

Bill No. 1001 dealt with when the county clerks could open and prepare absentee ballots to be counted.

Due to the large number of absentee ballots that have been requested from voters it would make it a difficult task for the clerk's office to open all ballots the day of the election and have them counted in a timely fashion.

Bill No. 1001 allows the clerk's office to begin opening the envelopes, in a secure manner, seven days prior to the election and will be counted after the polls are closed on election night.

In Washington County, absentee ballots will be opened and counted on Election Day.

The bill that was drafted by the Idaho House of Representatives addresses in-person voting.

House Bill No. 1 allows county clerks to have at least one polling place available for those who wish to vote in person on the day of the election.

All polling locations in Washington County will be open to the public on Election Day.

To allow for social distancing, Precinct 3, South Weiser and Precinct 6, East Weiser electors will vote at the Vendome Events Center instead of at their regular polling location at St. Agnes Catholic Church.

Voters in the Midvale precinct will vote at Midvale Veteran's Hall. All other locations will remain the same.

Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 3.

The county will have the DS200 precinct-based ballot scanner and vote tabulators at each precinct in the county. The equipment will replace the time-consuming practice of poll workers counting the ballots by hand. The scanner will scan the ballots, record the results in a database and print out the election results. Each precinct will

also retain the paper ballots in a locked box as required by Idaho Code.

Voters will fill in ovals with a black pen next to their candidate of choice. Voters will then insert their completed ballot into the scanner and tabulator. The device has a touch screen and display, which provides voters with instructions and immediate feedback after they insert a ballot.

The technology in the scanner and tabulator ensures that in the event a ballot is poorly marked the ballot is read accurately and consistently, protecting voter intent. If a ballot is marked wrong, such as when too many ovals are filled out, the machine will reject the ballot. Poll officials can void the bad ballot and issue a new one to a voter.

Due to the primary election in June being an all-mail election, over 1,800 voters also requested an absentee ballot be sent to them for the November general election. Washington County Clerk Donna Atwood urges anyone who requested an absentee ballot but would now like to vote in person to contact her office so an absentee ballot will not be mailed. Voters not sure if an absentee ballot was requested may also contact the clerk's office to verify.

Absentee ballots are scheduled to be sent out no later than Sept. 18 to military and overseas citizens, and by Sept. 30 for all other absentee ballot requests. There is a cost to the county to send out the ballots, so to save time and expense call the clerk's office at 208-414-2092.

Voter registrations may be received by the County Clerk until 5 p.m. on Oct. 9, 2020.

Applications for absentee ballots must be received by the County Clerk by 5 p.m. Oct. 23.

Persons may vote absentee at the County Clerk's office until Oct. 30 at 5 p.m.

Property rights and the use of public lands will be discussed

in areas subject to natural hazards and disasters, to protect fish, wildlife and recreation resources and to avoid undue water and air pollution.

If passed, all prescribed burns on federal lands shall comply with State of Idaho DEQ air quality rules and burns will have an approved start date and an out cold stop date.

The Forest Service shall limit spring burning due to smoke from burning wet materials and the ability to control fires burning into summer. No prescribed burns will be allowed during wildfire season, June 1 to Oct. 20.

The person designated to start and oversee the prescribed burn shall be personally responsible for any damage to private property.

Best management practices shall be submitted before an area is burned, such as logging, thinning and targeted intensive grazing of the

prescribed burn area.

Written permission from the rancher will need to be obtained in order to do a prescribed burn and all burns shall be coordinated with the county commissioners and the sheriff to proceed.

The sheriff will have the authority to enforce prescribed burn rules and the penalty for violating the code will be a misdemeanor with a fine of \$1,000 or 1 year in jail or both.

Ordinance 87 defines rules regarding road closures within federal lands.

It will require federal land administrators shall obtain county commissioners and sheriff's written approval to close any road under their management in the county where the federal land is located. It will give the sheriff authority to open roads and areas on federal land that are

needed for public access and safety.

Ordinance 87 states that federal law enforcement officers operate under the sheriff's authority and they shall not enforce any laws upon citizens of the county without permission from the sheriff.

Ordinance 88 will ensure property rights on federal lands. The ordinance cites the Curtis Act of 1898 which addresses split estate land disposal where timber and minerals are retained by the United States and tribes. The Homestead Act addresses land that is valuable for grazing and raising forage crops.

Ranchers are granted use of public lands in forest reservations to pasture their livestock as long as it appears that injury is not being done to the forest growth. If a person willfully or negligently interferes with the legal herding, grazing

or pasturing of livestock or with fence, gate, water development or other range improvement of private base property or on an adjudicated allotment will be guilty of a misdemeanor.

The ordinance will put into place that allotment holders will have the right to manage, refurbish, repair and improve their grazing preference lands by thinning timber, planting grass, and improving the water plus other practices that improve their grazing value as with any other private property they own. The rancher will be allowed to use the timber and stone resources for personal use.

County Commissioners are looking at deleting the time limit of six months for living in an RV. The new changes will require a building permit be obtained by anyone who is living full-time in RV’s, shack, storage shed or even a grain bin.

Commissioner proposes changes to regulations on living in RVs

County code limits residing in an RV to six months but that could change

One Washington County commissioner has proposed changes to the county code to address the growing number of people who are living full-time in RVs in the county.

The county code currently prohibits living in an RV, travel trailer or motor home for longer than six months per calendar year. RVs are defined as all recreation vehicles, camping trailers, truck campers and motor homes of 8.5 feet by 40 feet or less in size.

Commissioner Kirk Chandler said he would like to delete the current time limit of six months that someone can live fulltime in an RV or motorhome. He suggested adding language that would require anyone living in an RV or motorhome on their property to obtain a building permit and a permit from Southwest District Health for sanitation.

Chandler said there are RVs and motorhomes that people are living in that are as nice as actual homes. He said changing the code requiring a building permit would also apply to anyone living in a shack, storage shed or even a grain bin. The cost of a building permit would be minimal.

“That would cover all those different situations we’re running into,” he said.

The issue of full-time living in an RV came up when a complaint was recently lodged with the county planning and zoning department about someone living in a motorhome north of Weiser. The resident who complained raised concerns about sanitation at the location.

Chandler said the county cannot single out one individual living in an RV when there are others also living in motorhomes or RVs.

“We can’t enforce it on one unless we enforce it on everybody,” he said, and that would require actively looking for RVs that people are using as full-time residences in the county.

The proposed code changes would not apply to situations where an elderly parent moves into an RV next to a home to live closer to family. Those are different and handled by obtaining a special use permit through planning and zoning and noting a hardship exists.

The county’s prosecuting attorney would have to review any changes to the county code on RV regulations. From there, the changes would go to the planning and zoning commission for review and potential action.

Prosecuting Attorney Delton Walker said people who want to live

in a motorhome are not prevented from using their property as long as they take care of the sanitation and don’t impact the rights of neighbors.

“It’s a property right to be able to park on your property and live in a motorhome as long as it’s self-contained,” he said.

County planning and zoning administrator Bonnie Brent said Valley County is currently drafting an ordinance to address people living full-time in RVs. In that county, the cost of housing has forced some residents to live in RVs full-time.

The City of Weiser took the opposite approach and outlawed living in an RV for more than 30 days outside of an established RV park. The language in the city ordinance was broadened in March to include occupying any temporary shelter, including a tent, in addition to an RV, motorhome, camper or travel trailer within the city limits. Violating the ordinance can result in a \$100 fine.

The city will allow a residential property owner in the city to obtain a temporary use permit to park a RV, motorhome or travel trailer to be used for temporary living quarters for up to 180 days if there is an active building permit on the property for remodel or construction of a permanent dwelling.

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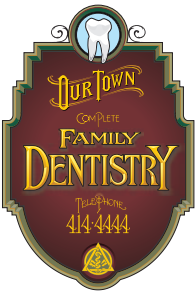
